I baled out at 25 00 ft and xxxxxxx badly burned and wounded from fix 20 MM and xxx landed in a birch wood just west of La Fere spraining my ankle. I triedto get up but impossible. I layed down for about and flak suit half hours stripping Chute west and dingy. I then crawled away into a thicket where put milk conc. on my burns. and finally made my way to the end of the woods. I waited until about 8 oclock and took off painfully toward a small town. O the approaches to this town Quessy there was a house. I approached it following a hedgerow behind which I took cover. I waited here hidden til a woman came out to hom I made a sign. She looked up and down the road along wich germsns were passing and when they had passed she went into the house and sent her husband out. The husband brought me out food and blanket and told me to remain hidden. The next morning. they took me in the house treated my wounds and gave me citilian clothes a girl came to me. She came back two hours latter with another girl and a horse cart in which they hid me and took me to the a huge man object 250 village of Faillouel the home the cheif of the local Res. Org. S me day Jacqueline and Jeannette Dumarquez two nurses of Frieres - Failloef (Aisne) came in a looked after my wounds. They then transfered me that same day to a home across the street the home of Micheline Henot's father where I stayed about a week. . There was considerable traffic of Germans here so the local chief decided that I should be moved. They walked me out to Res. dump and Hg. in the middle of the woods about 17 W. where I found another a have · Dilot . american P51 pilot Lt. Ted Skowronek 355 Ftr. Soo. two English A.men Russians and FFI. I stayed here two days and I night. until the 2nd S.pt. St. the Americans entered the the town Hung about that day and on 3rd S.pt. went down I and 51 pilot and Lanc. pilot by car to Chauny where reported to Eng. Medics who patched me up . and then went back to Henot's house where I stayed until the 4th

Then an ambulance was bourhest out to hospital and I was taken to Evacuation hosp. nearby. Then hitchhiked into Paris. Stayed over night and went to Le Bourget from where I was flown to A22 from where i was flown to A2, my group. I then went to A44 where my group moved. I got there the fith . On the 6th flew into Laval where I got my travel orders.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

- 1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in an entral country, or release from internment not only FURNISHES USEFUL INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY but also JEOPARDIZES FUTURE ESCAPES, EVASIONS AND RELEASES.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders.escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

## RESTRICTED

- 1. Because disclosures of information regarding evasion from capture, escape, details of imprisonment, release from internment, and repatriation have been made, the lives and services of fellow soldiers and those who help them have been lost or endangered. All information which you possess on these subjects, including the experiences of others as well as your own, briefings and equipment for evasion and escape, and preparations and other activities in connection therewith, constitutes MILITARY INFORMATION which is classified SECRET by the War Department.
- 2. You will therefore disclose no information whatever, beyond the fact of your return to duty from "missing in action" or "prisoner of war" or "internment", to anyone except the following military officials:
  - a. The first Military Attache to whom you report;
  - b. An officer designated by the Commanding General of an overseas Theatre of Operations;
  - c. The Prisoner of War Branch, MIS, Washington, D.C., the interrogating agency designated by the A/C of S, G-2, War Department General Staff;
  - d. Certain other officers holding written authority from the A/C of S. G-2, WDGS, to interrogate you.
- 3. You will particularly guard against disclosure of SECRET information to relatives, friends, representatives of the press and radio, and military officials, except as noted in a, b, c and d above.
- 4. In order to protect yourself against disciplinary action, any question involving publicity must be referred BY YOU PERSONALLY to the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, Washington, D.C.

### CERTIFICATE

I certify that I have read and fully understand all of the foregoing and the Directive of the Secretary of War, 6 Aug 43 (on the reverse side), and will at ALL TIMES hereafter comply fully therewith.

I understand that all information concerning escape, evasion from capture, activities and equipment in connection therewith, and details of imprisonment or release from internment, is SECRET and must not be disclosed to anyone except the military officials specifically designated. I further understand that disclosure to any other person will make me liable to disciplinary action for failure to safeguard MILITARY INFORMATION.

I realize that publicity concerning my experiences, by word of mouth or otherwise, will endanger the lives of many persons and therefore it is my duty to take all possible precautions to prevent it.

List all military information which you observed or were told while evading. Give fullest possible details. I was told that the German moned their A/2 from Germany into France and operate off just small field for a day or two and then return to Germany. And moral war very low.

2nd Lt. James C Johnston 0-758182 394/367 FtR 25 aug - 8 Sep On the 25th August 1944 my plane was fired by enemy fighters. I bailed out, badly burned and wounded, and landed in a wood just W of La Fere (AUNE) . I lay prome for 1 an hour, unable to rise and then made my way on all fours to the end of the wood, and then toward the village of Quessy (AUNE) . Close to the town I stopped by a house and signaled to a woman. She saw me and called her husband. He brought me food and a blanket and told me to remain hidden in a hedgerow. The next morning they brought me into their house, treated my wounds and gave me civilian clothes. A girl came to see me. She left and returned two hours later with another girl. They hid me in a horse-drawn cart and took me to XNXXXXXXX the village of Faillouel (AISNE) . This was the home of the local Resistance chief, a huge man weighing about 250 lbs. That same day Jacqueline and Jeannette Dumarquez, two nurses of Frieres - FaillovEL (ALSNE) visited me and dressed my wounds. I was then transferred that same day to the house across the street. This was the home of M. Henot and his daughter Micheline. I spent a week here and then the chief had me moved to a Resistance Hg. and dump situated about 12 miles to the W. Here I encountered Lt. Ted Skowronek, 2 RAF men and many Russians and FFI. I stayed here 2 days, until the 2nd Sept. when Americans entered the village. I stayed a M. Henot's home until the 4th Sept. and then was evacuated through Military channels.
